The soaring success of the Latin/ Salsa tent in the last five years has led to the birth of Glasto Latino where some of the world's leading acts from the Latin music genres will take to the stage. The likes of headliners Gerardo Rosales Y Su Combo Mondial and Roberto Pla's Latin Ensemble are two bands "you'd travel the world to see," according to Vijay Patel, one of the many Salsa dance teachers whose free beginner's classes will be hosted all day throughout the remainder of the festival. This will all take part in a large marquee, which has a dance floor that begs to be filled by hundreds. "Be warned, sexiness is inevitable," an

unnamed worker stated.

As I spoke with Vijay, people around us were taking in the Latin music that was blaring out and more than a few pairs of hips were loosening up by the time we got onto the subject of beverages. When I pointed out a huge "The Home Of Mojitos" banner, Vijay claimed that Glasto Latino is the best place to find a mojito outside of Cuba. BLOCK PARTY

A Tube train shooting out of the roof of a five-storey building, a Brooklyn tenement reminiscent of New York disco's halcyon days, and an outdoor acid house rave: it can only be the brainchild of Glastonbury legends Block9.

The east London art collective, comprised of Gideon Berger and Stephen Gallagher, are renowned for marrying audio and visual art and for creating spaces that redefine the idea of theatre. Everyone who steps inside Block9 becomes part of the performance.

They've been running the area since 2007, but Gideon has a much older affiliation with the Pilton party. 'I've been coming since I was 14,' he says. 'I know Glastonbury, and what we do is a culmination of the things we know appeals at this unique festival.' The pair have built an installation called the London Underground, complete with a Tube train flying out of its upper floors. Explains Gideon: 'Our venues mimic a mu-

sical genre. The Underground will

have that particular London thing,

a place to hear dubstep, drum 'n' bass.'

Their second arena, NYC Downlow, came about after they noted Glastonbury lacked an area celebrating our nation's vibrant gay scene. 'We built a ruined tenement and used it to resurrect New York's golden age and to house the homo fantasies of our crew,' says Gideon.

The third area at Block9, Genosys, brings back memories of raving before the Criminal Justice Act passed, when banging house music in open fields and decaying industrial landscapes were the order of the day.

It's not just stunning installations, though. Gideon draws on his passion for music to programme the area.

'The way I've looked at our venues is how my records are divided on my shelves at home,' he jokes. 'I considered the genres I love most and took them out of my house and into a field. It's as fun as it sounds. We have zero tolerance for bad music.'

My eating partner looks over to me. 'So much for the No Spice Rule,' he says. 'Reggae usually gets put off until Sunday afternoon,' says James Harper. 'Everyone thinks: let's have a nice bit of reggae on a Sunday, that'll be nice. We get fobbed off.' Harper is the man behind one of London's biggest reggae nights, Reggae Roast, and he's reflecting on how the UK reggae scene is often perceived. But things are changing. In recent years he's noticed a resurgence that's recognised in this year's Glastonbury schedule.

'Across the whole festival, reggae has been given a massive increase in exposure,' says James. 'It's a testament to how far UK reggae has come in the past two or three years. It's huge at the moment. I played my first reggae set here five years ago. Every year we've been

trying to push things as there's been so little reggae.'

This year the team took over The Cave on Friday from 10pm for an all-night Reggae Roast Jamdown – a Glastonbury version of the massive club night they host in Brixton every few months.

'We programmed those eight hours as if it was one of our club nights. We had various MCs and artists from the Reggae Roast label, Adam Prescott and Vibration Lab, and Mungo's Hi-Fi, a Glasgow-based soundsystem and label similar to our own. They're one of the biggest UK reggae sound systems.'

Reggae Roast also host The Blues in Silver Hayes on Sunday (10pmmidnight).

What a Rush!

YOU will have waved at Joe Rush.

He's the man at the helm of the Mutoid Waste Company, the ear-and-eye popping cavalcade of monster machinery that snakes through Glastonbury each day. He and the Mutoids first hit Glastonbury in 1985 – and it was partly the result of a police action to stop people meeting up at Stonehenge for the summer solstice.

"We had our Skull Bus and we were heading there but all of the middle of England was in lockdown," he recalled.

"So we thought we'd keep driving and we ended up in Glastonbury. We've been here ever since."

He says it's hard to describe quite how fun wriggling a 10-ton dinosaur is through the crowds.

"I love it," he says.

To kick off the Mutoid's weekend parades, Michael Eavis joined them at midday on Friday in The Park field and took the wheel with his daughter, Emily, as the Mutoid Waste machines – a dinosaur, a bull and the giant steam ship, decked out with a fat sound system – trundled through field and down track.

Being promoted to captain of the ship was not always the case for the host from Worthy Farm. The Mutoids are festival veterans and represent the old-school art chaos that is deep in its DNA.

"They used to give me no end of

nightmares, driving across the place. They caused me no end of trouble," recalls Michael. "But they are as good as gold now.

I took them down over time!" It's a team effort to turn a forklift

dumper truck into a mythical beast of monster proportions. "I'm not a great welder of metal," admits Joe. "But my team are: and we try different stuff out, and see what looks right."

The Company's distinctive bull – complete with snorting nostrils and glaring red eyes – was built as a present for Michael to use at the country event, The Bath and West Show, where he presents the herds that live here when the festival is all packed away for another year. He rocked up with the giant mechanical bull to say Happy 150th Birthday to the renowned agricultural show.

And their extraordinary work received a global audience last year, reveals crew member Tommy Mutoid.

"We drove the Steamship right into the opening ceremony of the Paralympics last summer," he says.

Rhianna was on board and belted out her hits from the prow of a boat which has run aground in The Park.

"It is a slightly different crowd at Glastonbury," he jokes.

"But we still made a bit of an entrance, as we do here, there, anywhere we go."
